President's Message



Your Board of Directors has been busy awarding funds to high school organizations and projects. At our March meeting we awarded \$1,000 to the faculty advisor for the Associated Student Body to upgrade the classroom where the ASB meets and stores the material it needs for

its activities. The school recently changed the location of this room, and the new room did not have the storage capacity. We also made our annual donation of \$2,500 to Sober Grad Night, an expense that is in our yearly budget, so the committee does not need to apply for funds each year. This donation is made as long as the event is held on the P.G. High campus.

We also voted to spend \$250 for a sponsorship for the P.G.H.S. girls' softball team, which plays at the municipal baseball diamond behind the old Lighthouse Elementary School on 17-Mile Drive. And we voted to award \$3,000 to the *NewsBreaker* staff so that they can put out two print editions of the school newspaper each year; these editions would be distributed both on campus and in town, to showcase the students' journalistic skills to residents. We are also gearing up to award scholarships in May. Lillian *Griffiths* '70, our Scholarship Committee chair, has alerted students and staff to the availability of the application forms online, and the committee will make sure that all of our scholarships are awarded. We

have some new scholarship awards this year; see the list of donations on p. 3.





Otto Paul Reimer was born Sept. 26, 1956, in Palo Alto to Edward and Helen Reimer. He attended P.G. schools, graduating from P.G.H.S. in 1974. Post-high school courses were completed in South Lake Tahoe. As a young adult, Otto invented the Rocket Power Golf Club while working in his parents' Golf Shop on Broadway Ave.

in Seaside. This club was featured in many golf magazines. Otto was a true craftsman, remodeling many homes in the Las Vegas area. He did the plumbing, electrical, and concrete and created unique designs for many projects during the early '80s when Las Vegas was rapidly growing. In 1985, Otto suffered a horrific head injury at a water park in Las Vegas. His left leg was amputated above the knee, and he no longer had use of his left arm due to nerve damage. He was cared for by his family. Throughout these challenges, he maintained his sense of humor and was always positive. In 2002, he became the first resident for a program with a new concept for independent living for the severely handicapped. His determination and will was an inspiration to all his doctors. He was even interviewed by Chris Cuomo on 60 Minutes for his incredible story of determination. Otto passed away on Dec. 13, 2022 due to injuries suffered in an accident with his Hoveround. He is survived by his sister Rebecca, and brother Tom Reimer '65, both of Henderson, NV.

April 2023

Virginia Elaine Fox Abplanalp, known as "Gingy," died at age 90 on April 29, 2023, in Walnut Creek. She was born May 9, 1932, in New London, CT, where her father was stationed on a submarine. She lived in several locations in Southern California while her father served in the U.S. Navy, and the family moved to P.G. in 1937, when she was 5, to be closer to her maternal grandparents. The family purchased four lots (one acre) of undeveloped land in the Del Monte Forest for \$100 near her grandparents'

land. Since there was no road to either property, the family first had to clear a two-block-long path through the thick forest, which would later be Buena Vista Avenue.

The first structure was a two-hole outdoor toilet, followed by the placement of a cast iron woodstove, where her mother cooked outdoors for her father and the hired carpenters until it was moved into the newly constructed home. There were no utilities, so the family carried buckets of water from an outdoor faucet at another location and used a kerosene lantern for light. Finishing the homes at 1313 and 1316 Buena Vista took longer than planned due to the supply shortages of WWII. The family raised chickens and rabbits and had a goat for milk and a garden. In her senior year at P.G.H.S., Gingy was the *Knockout* editor, manager of the annual school Variety Show, second lead in the senior play, and member of the Honor Society. She also lettered in girls' sports and was attendant to the May Queen before graduating in 1950. In addition to school and extracurricular activities, Gingy worked for three years at various soda fountains in P.G. At MPC, Gingy edited the college paper and was student body secretary, a pom-pom girl, a member of the scholarship society, and homecoming princess, all while working at a soda fountain at the Pebble Beach drug store, where she met several celebrities, including Dean Martin, and her former, now deceased, husband, Fritz A. Abplanalp Jr.; they married in Carmel in 1953. Gingy graduated from UC Berkeley in 1954 and obtained teaching credentials. She taught in the Rodeo School District, Berkeley, and then in Moraga until she retired. In retirement, Gingy and her friend Charlie Cesare traveled the world before they settled in Walnut Creek. Gingy was very active until her sudden death.

A long-time member of the PGHSAA, in her later years, she was a regular contributor to the *Knockout II*. She was preceded in death by her significant partner Federico Carlos "Charlie" Cesare, her parents Harry Millard and Virginia Ruth Fox, and brothers James Taber Fox '52 and Steven Blair Fox '64. Her younger brother Gilbert Millard Fox died shortly after Gingy, on June 18, in Salinas. She is survived by her children Melinda Suzanne Abplanalp and Eric Allen Abplanalp,



Rian Dundon '99 Publishes New Book

Portland, Oregon is perhaps best known for being a sustainability-minded, pedestrian city with an abundance of great coffee, craft beer, good food, live music, fine art and crafts, and people who value both individuality and community. Yet things shifted in late spring 2020, when the city experienced a number of riots. Anyone who really wanted to understand “Portland’s Summer of Rage” had to be there. Rian Dundon ‘99 was.



Born in Portland, documentary photographer Rian Dundon was raised in P.G., where

his family remains and his uncle is a postal carrier. Yet in 2019, Dundon, who has been photographing “the rise of extreme politics” on the West Coast since 2016, returned his home in Portland, just a few blocks from the protests that ignited after the May 25, 2020, murder of George Floyd. Dundon was close enough to photograph the fear, the rage, and the intensity.

“At the time, I was working for *Time Magazine*, *Vanity Fair*, and *The Atlantic*,” said Dundon, “but when something like these protests are happening, you don’t sit around and wait for an assignment. You go.”

For 100 nights, Dundon witnessed the demonstrations, recording events amid the sting of pepper spray, the explosion of a gas canister, and the haze of tear gas. The result is his new book *Protest City: Portland’s Summer of Rage*.

Dundon became interested in photography while growing up in P.G. His mother was an amateur photographer, he says, which meant inspiration, guidance, and cameras were always available. In the 1990s, he started taking pictures of his friends skateboarding in P.G. “Pretty soon,” he said, “I found myself more interested in the people than the sports element of skateboarding. Already looking at journalistic photog- 9 raphy, studying magazines like *National Geographic*, I

became interested in documentary photography.”

Dundon earned an MA in Social Documentation at UCSC in 2012, and then went to New York University, where he graduated with a BFA in Photography and Imaging. He previously taught photography at the San Francisco Art Institute and will soon start teaching at Clark College, a junior college in Vancouver, WA.

Protest City: Portland’s Summer of Rage is a photographic and written commentary with a foreword by journalist Donnell Alexander and an introduction by historian Carmen P. Thomson. It’s available via Oregon State University Press and Amazon; Dundon has published two previous books. Visit his website at riandundon.com.

Ken Cooley '71 Wins State Award

On November 13, the *Gold River Messenger* reported that Ken Cooley, a former California Assemblymember, has been given the Bettye Fahrenkamp Award for Distinguished Legislative Leadership on behalf of Western States.

The award, made by the Council of State Governments West (CSG West),

which includes Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, New Mexico, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming, honors legislators who, according to the *Messenger*, "display an ability to see and work beyond the border of their own states in the interest of the West." Cooley was active in CSG West while he served in the California Assembly as the democratic representative from the 8th State Assembly District, which is made up of seven California counties in the Central Sierra Nevada and Eastern Sierra regions, from 2014 to 2020. He was chief counsel to the Finance and Insurance Committee and served as legal counsel to State Farm Insurance from 1991 to 2008.

Cooley was an invited participant in CSG West's Western Legislative Academy in Colorado Springs, and he chaired the first Legislative Oversight Working Group for the council. Under Cooley's leadership, this group produced the first *Western Legislative Oversight Handbook* to help CSG West achieve its goals of cooperation among Western state governments.

Cooley has had a lengthy career in law and politics. He graduated from UC Berkeley in 1977 and from the McGeorge School of Law at the University of the Pacific in 1984. He then worked as chief of staff to state Assemblyman Lou Papan and as legislative counsel at the California Land Title Association. In 1988, Cooley returned to the California State Assembly. He was also elected mayor of Rancho Cordova in 2005. He's married to Sydney *Smith* Cooley '71.

Library Features P.G.H.S. Art

Forty-one Pacific Grove High School Advanced and AP art students were honored with a display of their work at the Pacific Grove Public Library from January through mid-March. Their Winter Exhibit 2024 in the Library's Nancy & Steve Hauk Gallery featured 26 works of art that responded to the challenge made by art teacher Matthew Kelly: create a work of art using a 14x14 wood panel that expresses your individual artistic voice. Students were also asked to write an artist's statement to provide insight; the statements were displayed along with the artwork.

PGUSD Improvements

The PGHSAA is, of course, not the only organization that provides money to P.G.H.S. For the first time in your editor's memory, the Pacific Grove Unified School District and the Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee have created a welcome "Report to the Community" mailer that outlines the improvements made recently using money raised by 2020's Measure D, a \$30 million municipal General Obligation Bond. This taxpayer money is designated for repairing and replacing roofs and modernizing classrooms. A 2014 bond in the amount of \$18 million is still being used to upgrade educational software and increase student access to computers.

Current projects using bond money are as follows: At P.G.H.S., the floor of the band room (estimated to have been there since the building was originally built) was replaced, removing hazardous material safely and installing an ultra-low VOC (volatile organic compound) luxury vinyl plank flooring, according to the mailer. The previous floor was tiled, and the new floor "provides improved air quality and better sound resonance. It also allows instruments to move more freely throughout the room." This project was completed in August 2023 at a cost of \$50,000.

P.G. High also received new roofing and exterior paint for Buildings A, B, C, D, and M, at a cost of \$1.6 million. Again, these roofs had not been replaced for some time, and the gutters were rusting through. This project was also completed last August, and the mailer indicates that Buildings K and L at the high school received this same treatment in 2021. Roofing and paint for the remaining buildings on the high school campus will follow.

Robert H. Down also received a new \$260,000 roof, and Forest Grove buildings received new roofs and paint, at \$1.1 million. Those two campuses and the Middle School, according to the mailer, "have been equipped with new flex tech labs with student computers and tables, 3D printing and scanning hardware, interactive panel displays, robotics kits, and computer programming software." Cost for this project was \$100,000.

P.G. High Sports News

Freshman **Isabella Bertolucci** was recently named to the Olympic Development Program's soccer team. According to its website, the Olympic Development Program (ODP) "is a national process for identifying and developing the best youth soccer players. The process promotes players to the U.S. National Teams, which represent the United States in international competition, such as the Youth World Cup and the Olympics."

P.G. High junior **Savannah Hardy** earned Honorable Mention on the *Monterey Herald's* All-County Girls' Basketball Team this spring, and three members of the boy's team also received that honor: sophomore **Gabe Valencia**, senior **Anthony Nimri**, and freshman **Andrew Nimri**.

The Breakers were also featured in a story in the Feb. 7 *Monterey Herald* that noted coach **Dan Powers'** decision to put two freshmen on the varsity basketball team: **Andrew Nimri** (see above) and **Sergen Serttunc**.

"I have never concerned myself with the grade or age when it comes to putting the best lineup on the court," Powers, himself a 1996 P.G.H.S. graduate, was quoted as saying. Two other players are sophomores.

Powers' gamble seems to have paid off; at the time the story appeared in February, the team was 9-3 in its division. Currently they are 15-11 overall; 10-4 league. *Herald* photo below reprinted with permission.




Classic Bowhay

You know how it is. You grow up in a place you call home, know it, accept it, probably like it, and know your way around. As you may remember, my dad was a forest ranger, and I was born in Bakersfield. From the time I was two months old, we came to P.G. almost every month to visit my mother's hometown.

This is where I grew up; it's my hometown, elementary school and high school; and it's where I worked and played. Didn't realize how lucky I was, but it felt good for a lot of reasons. Now, many years later, I have an almost spiritual appreciation for the indescribable beauty of this place---nothing like it anyplace else in the world. If you have forgotten, drive around the Peninsula is if it is your first time. Try Uber, or walk. Ride a bike—even take a tour.

When we were kids, we wandered down to the beach, kicked the kelp, ran and chased the waves. We knew all the rocks from Hopkins Marine all the way to Asilomar Beach. All this before wet suits, and we spent very little time in the water. Cold! But lots of time ON the water in all kinds of boats—we could rent a skiff from Sprague at the P.G. pier, row out in the bay a mile or so, and catch sand dabs or anything else that would bite. Somehow the water did not seem so cold when we jumped in off the boat. We spent hours studying the tidepools, poking the anemones, and teasing the hermit crabs.

And the woods! Sometimes right down to the ocean. Just look at those pines, the ones that didn't blow down. The wild ceanothus, bright blue against the green. Now and then a cocoon, developing into a big, magnificent moth.

We learned early, but early enough, about the perils of poison oak. More about that some other time, but the color is almost worth the peril...shiny green in huge clusters, vining up the pine trunks, then deep red in the fall.


The big, wonderful sand dunes are gone, but still some smaller ones near Spanish Bay and Asilomar. The dunes were one of our playgrounds, even up through our teen years. Ah, the stories we could tell. The Peninsula was and is picture perfect, and perfect for

pictures, easier now to capture with digital than out wonderful old Kodaks.

Among other things, fish were the heart and soul of our part of the world—salmon, sardines, and squid a part of our lives. Still some flavor of our heritage as you walk down Fisherman's Wharf and Wharf No. 2. We knew the smell of the sea, especially the smell of prosperity when the canneries were working, with plenty of jobs. Still a fine mix of fishing boats in the harbor, but gone are the purse seiners, almost our signature ships, bringing in tons of sardines. During World War II, some of the seiners were requisitioned by the government and converted to mine sweepers.

No more sounds of artillery from Fort Ord, but still bugle calls from the Presidio. We still honor our military history and presence. And that's another story, with plenty to remind us and share.


