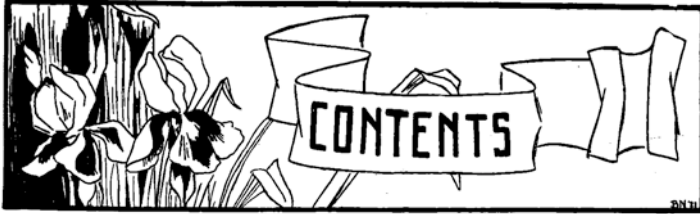

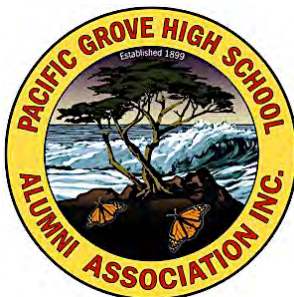

This is a picture of the 1943 graduating class from Pacific Grove Grammar School, which I hope will be of some value to Steve Ibrahim's project. I can identify several students from the PGHS Class of 1947: I'm furthest left in row 1, and Phil Bowhay is furthest left in the top row. Don Gasperson is fourth from the right in row 1; over his right shoulder in row two is Marty Larkin. Over his right shoulder is Ina Beth Watson, and over her right shoulder is Annie *Guastella* Richerts. Art King is third from the left in row five, I think that's Dick Baxter on the right of the top three, and I think that's Ernie Flores in the fifth row, first boy from the right. That's Hilma *Schaar* Smith below the third girl from the left on the top row, and I think that's Kathy *Schwab* Lewis in the first row, ninth from the left, and Marie *Partridge* Rosenblatt is the second girl from the left in the second row. I'd better quit while I'm ahead (if I am). Again, I hope this helps.

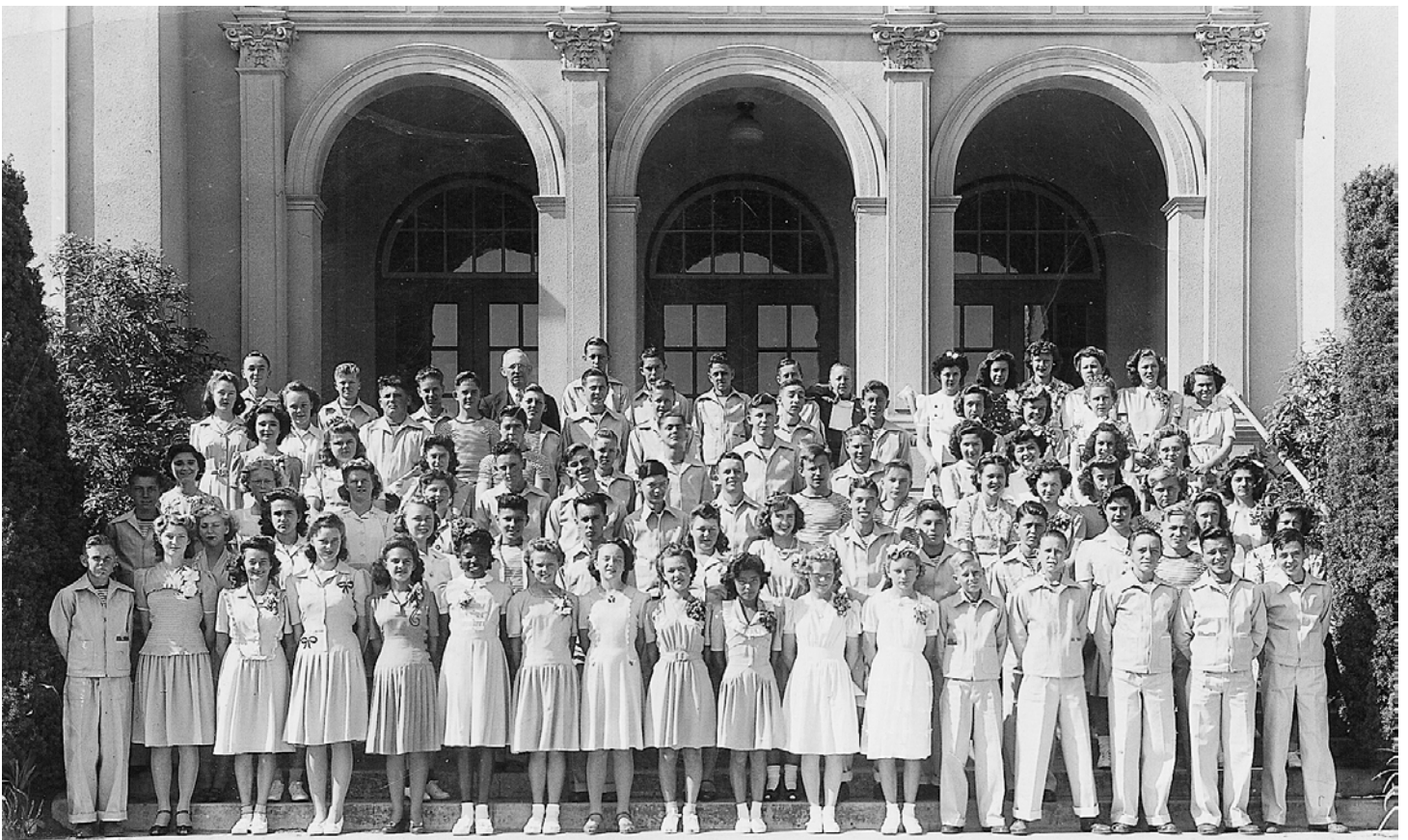

She was an avid reader, solver of crossword and other puzzles, hiker, and jazz aficionado. Survivors include her daughter Chris; three grandchildren; sister Elizabeth *Follette* Glen '43; and brother William *Follette* '41. She was predeceased by her parents, husband Kenny Johnson, and sister Nancy *Follette* Carlson '46.

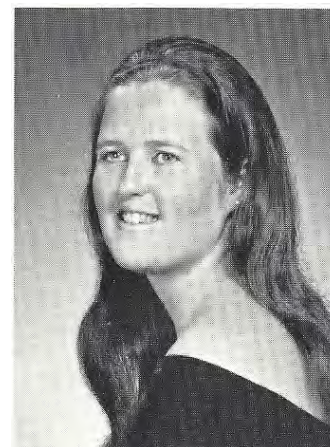
PGHSAA board meeting.
