Howell's wife Yollie still has the license plate that says, "California THANKS Howell D. Wood." As the Woods traveled the world with the State Department, that plate was always on their wall.

Howell was an accomplished pilot and had licenses to fly in the U.S., Chile, and El Salvador. In addition to spending 23 years in the State Department, he worked for Bechtel, Kaiser Engineers, Utah Mining, and J. A. Jones. He built the Ministry of Foreign Affairs for Prince Saud Al Faisal, who cemented their friendship with boxes of Cuban cigars. In Riyadh, Howell built the Diplomatic City, where all the embassies of the world were located. Because it's hard to hit a moving target, the Woods were evacuated, along the way, from Iran, El Salvador and Chile. Yollie, a native of El Salvador, claims the biggest loss was Iranian caviar. On a fashion note, Howell was stuck on Red Wing Boots and wore them even with his tux and dinner jacket.

Howell was responsible for building and reinforcing our embassies, and he lived with his family in most of the world's capitals. We certainly could have used him again in the past few years, and right up to now!

You may have read my true story a few years ago, "Saving Yancey's Nuts." Howell, of course, was Yancey. If you missed it, it appears below.

Saving Yancey's Nuts

A long time ago we all learned First Aid: Boy Scouts, high school, Civil Defense, etc. I suppose it's still part of the drill, with special emphasis on CPR, and a good thing it is. You never know when you're going to need it. Sometimes the special

need isn't described in the manual, and you just have to make the best of it.

In the summer between high school and college, my pal Yancey and I hiked in to Ventana Creek, a few miles up the Big Sur River. We camped, fished, drank a little beer, and the next morning packed up and headed out. The climb from the river up to the main trail is steep, and even though we were in good shape, we huffed and puffed and broke a good sweat after a few hundred yards of switch-backs.

At about this point, I noticed Yancey seemed a little quiet and asked how he was doing. He said, "Boy, I don't know, but I've got a serious ache in my nuts!" I made a few inappropriate—and unappreciated—remarks about the quality of his recent sex life, but realized quickly that these weren't funny. I suggested that by the time we climbed up to the main trail he might feel better, but old Yancey was not reassured.

When we got to the trail, still about four miles from Big Sur, Yancey said he had to take a look. He shrugged off his pack and dropped his pants, right on the trail, not giving a damn if anyone hiked by. Well, sure enough, the problem was easy to spot. A fat tick was actively boring into Yancey's scrotum. Now I won't say that Yancey almost fainted, but actually, he almost did. An intense assessment of the situation followed, and Yancey, especially, agreed that the tick had to come out. He could only imagine the consequences if that tick was allowed to continue its inward journey. He was right, of course, and although Yancey's sex life suffered for a few days, he went on in later years to reproduce handsomely with a half a dozen kids, give or take.


1974 Plans Its 40th

An 84-year-old Washington State woman will soon hold her 1953 university class ring, lost six decades ago, after it was found in a dried-up West Texas lake. Elizabeth Clark lost her Howard Payne University class ring in 1954 in Lake Nasworthy near San Angelo when she and her future husband went for a picnic and waded into the water. Clark said she wasn't certain where she had lost the ring—after discovering it was missing, she looked around her home before going back to search the lake.

After years of drought, the ring revealed itself in the lake bed. Someone from the school's alumni association drove to San Angelo to retrieve the ring and was able to identify it from the initials—AEL for Addie Elizabeth Little—inside the band. "I worked hard for that ring," Clark said. "I'm grateful it was found and that it was in good shape after 60 years." The ring, which is 10-karat gold with a blue stone, needed some cleaning up by a local jeweler.
