President's Message


A letter from Ed Hewitson '43 sent me on a walk to the Pacific Grove Public Library to look through microfilm archives of the local newspaper, and to my own postcard collection to see if I could find a mid-century street scene of Pacific Grove. Both searches made me think about the so-called "Information Age" that we live in, and, despite that bold title, how much information is lost—as well as found—every day.

I've been using the microfilm at the P.G. Library since I worked as a shelver there after school in my senior year, and it's clear now that whizzing through those two plates of glass has done a lot of damage to the microfilm over the years. The image I was looking for—an ad for Ed's father's Pacific Grove grocery store, is reproduced on P. 5, and you can see the distortions that make it difficult to read. And this 1949 reel is one of the less-damaged ones! Digitizing these archives now won't be much help, and this is the only existing record.

What will happen to the history we record in these pages? Well, you say, it's digitized, it's easy to access. But I remember working as a technical writer in the 1990s, and our stunned realization at one point that we had blithely replaced computers with newer versions until we were unable to refer to some of our legacy documentation, which was stored on those old, truly "floppy," 5 ¼" disks. No machine could read them! Much is being lost even as archival technology evolves—never mind the natural degradation of paper and other ephemera.

My postcard collection spurred yet another revelation. I purchased a clutch of wonderful old Pacific Grove postcards at a local antique store in the 1990s, all of them sent from someone named Louise to members of the Genuit family in Stockton. Louise evidently summered in Pacific

Grove in the early 1900s and wrote to the Genuits about her activities. Below is one of her cards, dated August 1907, which reads on the back, "I do not write often because we are not at home long enough. We went after huckleberries Tuesday and found enough for a pie and some sauce. Love, Louise."



Many of Louise's postcards were written to "Charley," in a tone that indicated he was a child—a little brother? A nephew? I looked up the address in Stockton on Google Maps, hoping to see a magnificent old Victorian. Alas, the street now contains run-down duplexes with cars in various stages of non-operation parked in driveways. Then I googled "Charles Genuit," and found, at files.usgwarchives.net, a list of people buried in the El Carmelo Cemetery in Pacific Grove up until 2000, and this information:

So Charley was a six-year-old boy when Louise wrote those postcards to him. An e-mail to our genealogy expert Sue *Taylor* '68 to see if Charley was by chance a PGHS grad gave me



Many of us grew up with an implicit promise that the biggest changes in our futures would involve transportation—flying cars, colonies on the moon. But the real revolution has been in storage and retrieval of information. Think of doing this research 50 years ago; it would have taken weeks.

Those still living and those who come after us have a duty to preserve and make available as many memories as possible, and you can probably guess my conclusion—start by submitting them to the Knockout II! 
Recently, Pacific Grove's weekly newspaper, The Cedar Street Times, published an article about Zena Holman and her 3,000+ volume research library, which resides at Asilomar. It was fascinating.

Zena collected first editions and other books. concentrating on California history. The article talked about the Zamarano 80, something I had never heard of before. Googling the name, I found a nice history of the club and their efforts to compile what finally became The Zamorano 80: A Selection of Distinguished California Books Made by Members of the Zamorano Club, Los Angeles, 1945. Apparently Zena was very proud to have been able to collect copies of each title, probably many first editions.

Naturally, I perused the list of references. I had gotten halfway through and stopped when it occurred to me that I knew quite a few of these titles. I was naturally a bit confused since I am not a history major. Growing up in Pacific Grove, I was influenced to turn to another great local resource, the environment. I became a botanist, though how I missed becoming a marine biologist I do not know, since I spent practically every day

> of my childhood at Lovers Point (LOL).

I am an avid reader, but really, how could I know so many of these old and respected, but often obscure, titles? And then I remembered really loving Mr. Grate's class in California History at PGHS. I think now he must have opened doors

They have been part of the research library at the Mott Training Center at Asilomar ever since. Holman also donated a significant American Indian artifact collection to Old Town Monterey." The 2007 story centered on a remodeling of the Mott Center to bring it up to ADA standards, and mentioned that "many old treasures were rediscovered, including a complete 17th-Century Spanish illuminated manuscript and a first edition copy of Richard Henry Dana's Two Years Before the Mast, published in England."

Visiting the Soviet Union During the Cold War

While teaching and coaching "army brats" at Wurzburg American High School in Germany in the early '60s, I had the opportunity to tour Premier Khrushchev's Soviet Union. This was an exciting time in history. The Berlin Wall was going up, the Cuban Missile Crisis was in full swing, and Khrushchev vowed to bury the U.S. My fellow passengers were all American teachers on Easter break. The tour company was West German, as were our guide and driver.

Passing through Czechoslovakia, Poland, and into the Soviet Union, we could see their impenetrable borders—guard towers, barbed wire fences backed by mine fields, and plenty of heavily armed patrols, hence the name "Iron Curtain." When we reached the Russian border, our bus was parked over a grease pit and the underside was inspected for contraband, as was the interior. Women's fashion magazines were a special target. The Russian inspector even took a letter out of my baggage that I forgot to mail when leaving the base. He ripped it open and began reading it, periodically looking up at me with suspicion.

Joining us at the border, our Russian guide "inspired" us with sleep-producing facts on how many shoes, tires, and cubic meters of cement

were produced in the various cities we passed through. The landscape was bleak, as were the unpainted villages, right.

breaks" proved humorous and embarrassing mainly for the women. Because of great distances between destinations and a lack of facilities, we were at the mercy of the elements. Women went to the left of the road, where there never seemed to be trees or bushes. To the right, there always were trees or bushes for the men.

Moscow, compared to western cities, was primitive. Taxis, busses, and government cars seemed to be the only vehicles present. The people spent their lunch breaks in long lines

waiting to buy necessities. Hefty women, right, in rubber boots wielded jackhammers repairing the streets while smoking men



slouched nearby. One of Premier Khrushchev's projects was to provide housing for his people, who were grossly overcrowded, sometimes having two or three families in a single flat. On these new apartments we noticed chicken wire stretched completely around each building one story high. The wire was to prevent people on the sidewalk from the falling decorative tiles—and people hadn't even moved in yet.

Our group visited Lenin in his special mausoleum. No pictures were permitted. While viewing Lenin, I heard a click. Our German guide,

Manny, had snapped a picture and gotten away with it. We finally found Stalin's insignificant



grave, above right, outside the Kremlin walls, and it had nothing but his name and the dates of his birth and death. He had lost favor.

Two young men who were "guides in training" joined us for our city tour. The next day, Manny was apprehended for taking photos of KGB headquarters where, of course, the Soviet secret police resided. While being interrogated and having his film exposed, he saw the two "trainees" in full KGB uniforms. On our tour, they had been spying on us. Fortunately, Manny was released the next day.

There were a few highlights in this inhospitable land, and they weren't the food.

Shostakovich's ballet *Spartacus* proved to be exhilarating. At that time, Russian ballet was the



best in the world. St. Basil's Church, left, with its colorful candy-like turrets, was an eye-pleaser. The Russians' underground rail system was highly efficient.

It was time to catch our plane back to West Germany. As we neared the airport, Manny began snapping pictures again. Airports were high on the list of

photo no-no's. Some of us wondered if our guide might be a West German spy.

As we went through customs, the Soviet inspectors performed one more heinous act. They randomly exposed some of our group members' film. I was fortunate and escaped Russian paranoia. (Editor's note: These photos are from Terrell's 1960 color slides, which have faded quite a bit; we were able to improve the b&w contrast a little using the new Mac Photo application.)

Our trip to the Soviet Union was interesting and educational, but it made us realize how fortunate we were to be Americans.

Footnote: A teacher friend of mine in the '90s took some students to Russia (no longer the Soviet Union). While waiting in line to view Lenin, one student exclaimed, "I didn't know John Lennon was that popular in Russia." So much for the American educational system!

The Butterfly Trees



Editor's note: in the 1920s, the little softcover Sea Urchin held the usual class photos and activities, but it also served as the school's literary magazine. This piece, its information familiar to us all, appeared in 1920. The drawing of the trees, which was unsigned, is also from the 1920 Sea Urchin.

Nature knows that Pacific Grove has an ideal winter climate and she advertises this fact among her delicate little creatures of the air, the butterflies. Each year there is an annual migration of butterflies to this locality at a time when other sections of the country are wrapped in winter's mantle of snow. You may laugh at this statement and think it is not so, but upon investigation it is found to be true.

Early in November and continuing through the winter months the big brown butterflies may be seen flitting about in the sunshine in your garden or among the flowers, which seems only natural. One forgets that it is winter and that such frail creatures are not generally supposed to be flitting about as is their wont in the late spring and summer. They are guided by an instinct, which seems to change very little from year to year. They do not only come to this particular region but select a certain group of trees where they congregate by the thousands and, it seems, even millions.

In a secluded spot by the side of the picturesque road leading to the lighthouse, and not more than a few hundred yards from the ceaseless roar of the "Old Pacific," these butterflies gather in great multitudes on the tall pine trees and so completely cover them that they resemble great bunches of brown leaves. At a single glance one wonders what those great dark clusters on the trees are. Perhaps they are pine cones, but no, you look again and presently you will see a butterfly



make a downward flight, then light on a limb of the tree and join one of these clusters. You do not need to watch so closely, for now you see many of these little creatures flying in the air. They become so matted together in these clusters that often great numbers are found lying dead on the ground beneath the trees. If some heartless creature should take delight in throwing small rocks or sticks at them, they would all take flight and the heavens above would be darkened by a heavy brown cloud of these small creatures.

Hundreds of people visit this spot annually to see what are known as the "Butterfly Trees." During the day the butterflies fly about the gardens in town, but toward evening and during occasional rainy weather they go to their usual haunt. They are never molested by the birds because they feed mostly upon milkweed, which gives them a peculiar bitter taste which the birds do not like. They are Monarchs, or *Anosia Plexippus*, and are easily identified by their wide, reddish-brown wings, with black edges and veinings. It has long been known by scientists that they do not hibernate, as do their lesser brethren, but migrate in vast numbers to warmer lands during the cold months in other parts of the world. They may frequently be observed in great numbers flying steadily in one direction as if with some fixed purpose in view. There may be other places in different parts of the earth to which they go but Pacific Grove is the only winter home of the Monarch thus far known.

About the middle of March they disappear as if by magic, but where they come from or whither they go no one knows. It is evident though that Nature is caring for her children and leads them to a place of safety where they may not be destroyed by cold, blasting winds.


